#### Explore a wilderness within reach

Welcome to Marradong Country, 90 minutes south east of Perth. Marradong encompasses the Shires of Boddington, Williams and Wandering and is homes to rolling hills, expansive skies, native bushlands, historic buildings and is one of only two remaining habitats of WA's elusive state emblem, the numbat.

The region's name, Marradong Country, is the correct Aboriginal [Noongar] name for the district (Williams, Wandering, Boddington). It is part of the Willman nation and is drawn from the word 'Marra' which means hand. Marradong refers to a unique hills formation in the district that resembles a hand.


Discover and explore history, nature and open spaces all to be freely enjoyed.



Being the most populous town in Marradong Country you will never tire of things to do. No matter what your age or interest, there is something for everyone. Walk along the banks of the picturesque Hotham River where you'll find a magnificent public recreation space that includes a nature play space, a skate park, multipurpose courts, a pump track, an outdoor exercise space, shade and BBQ structures and amphitheatre style tiered seating.

Boddington is emerging as a tourist mecca of people enjoying local public quirky artworks, the Interpretive Centre or enjoying a choice of cafes along the main street. Close to the town are a range of nature based trails including Ranford Pool Walk, Bibbulmun Track, and Tullis Bridge Trail. Explore local Aboriginal history by taking a look at Dilyan's Grave and the mining industry by marvelling at South32's bauxite mine overland conveyor belt. There are a number of events held each year to enhance your visit including, the Boddington Lion's Rodeo and Community Festival in November, Boddington Arts Council's Field of Quilts held in September and Sunday markets.

With a number of accommodation options to suit your budget, use Boddington as base for your Marradong Country self-drive trail or just come for the day. On the way home pick up some fuel and snacks at Riverside Roadhouse and Bakery or Three-ways Roadhouse for a safe passage home.




Williams, one of the oldest settled areas in Western Australia, is the "Gateway to the Great Southern Region". Much more than a pit stop for travellers, this friendly farming community encourages you to stop and 'smell the roses' which is notable for its magnificent display of "500 roses in 400m" along the main street over the summer and well into the cooler months. Located on the banks of the Williams River the Lion's park is a popular and pleasant place for a barbecue or picnic, used by locals and travellers alike with BBQs, public toilets, a nature play area and a riverside walkway which also serves as a dog exercise area. Stop at local cafes or shop at the Williams Woolshed for that hard to find gift or local produce. Williams is also home to its annual Gateway Expo held in April.

5km north west of the Williams, the well sign posted Williams Nature Reserve, just off the Albany Highway, is set aside for the conservation of flora and fauna which provides visitors with suitable access and day-use facilities such as parking, information, a lookout and picnic table.

Focus on Marradong Country's rich history by booking a time to visit Jesse Martin's Historical Village or by following Williams Heritage Trail enroute to Quindanning passing many points of interest including the Marling Pioneer Cemetery.





The small village of Wandering is nestled in a scenic valley and is the gateway to Numbat Country, Dryandra Woodland. The Community Centre has a picnic area and BBQs. In the main street, near the historic Agricultural Hall (now the Community Resource Centre) is Len Zuk's Sculpture of a pioneer and his horse, based on Wandering being founded the 'The Horses Came First', a book which can also be viewed in the Community Resource Centre. Stop for lunch at the historic tavern for lunch or at the local CRC for coffee or a light snacks. Along Wogolin Gully, take a walk on the Lion's Heritage and Nature Trail from the Caravan Park which has recently had major upgrade with modern facilities.

Wandering has the reputation for being the coldest town in WA so bring your winter woollies and start exploring or come for the annual Spring Fair or Autumn Graze long table luncheon. Enroute to Pumphrey's Bridge and Dryandra, on the outskirts of town, is historic St Martin's church and historic homestead 'Grassdale'. Annual activities include the Autumn Long Table Lunch and the Vintage Motor Cross Scramble. Spring time is abound with wildflowers and yellow fields of dazzling canola crop as far as the eye can see.





The drawcard for the locality of Quindanning is most certainly the Elizabethan styled heritage listed Ye Olde Quindanning Inne. The hotel is one of the most easily recognisable historic buildings in the district, where for more than 100 years, travellers and locals have been visiting.

Today the hotel hosts concerts and functions, serves hearty pub meals and ales and accommodates travellers in its bygone era rooms. With its generous use of Jarrah panelling, open wood fires, quiet location, sprawling gardens and long veranda's. Next to the hotel is St Boniface historic stone church. During the town's history, Quindanning has had a general store, post office, hairdresser and café. Currently, the town has a hotel, church, community hall and a racecourse.

The racecourse is used for the annual Quindanning Picnic Races, held every Easter Saturday. The road from Quindanning to Boddington is arguably the most scenic within Marradong Country as it meanders along the valley with rolling hills passing pioneer gravesites and St Alban's historic church.





The locality of Dryandra certainly is the jewel in the crown of Marradong Country as it is home to our endangered state's fauna emblem the Numbat and an unsurpassed array of other native wildlife. The Dryandra Woodlands is an important conservation area covering 28,000 hectares established by Department of Parks and Wildlife to protect the Numbat and many other animals that thrive here.

Dryandra reserve is a proposed National Park and has two campgounds, Gnaala Mia and Congelin, within the Marradong Region complete with camp kitchens and toilets. Tours are available at the nearby, internationally renowned Barna Mia Wildlife Sanctuary in the evening.

Enjoy wildflowers and views of wild kangaroos and echidnas munching on the oval in the evening from the front porch of the self-contained cottages or dormitories at the Lions Dryandra Woodlands Village.


